eSTOP controllers

eSTOP controllers are equipped with an additional safety system which immediately stops the tool when the emergency system of the workstation is activated.

eSTOP stands for "Emergency stop".

When the eSTOP button is pushed, the tool stops immediately and the user info code "E918" is displayed on the controller screen.



Two conditions are required to release the tool:

- the tool must receive a "RESET" signal from the PLC (min. duration: 10 ms)
- the eSTOP button must be pressed again.

The message will then disappear from the screen and the tool will be ready to use again.

(i) The eSTOP signal is available on the I/O 24V, Fieldbus and eBUS.

eBUS accessories

Up to 15 eBUS accessories can be daisy-chained to the eBUS port of the system.

The **socket tray** is designed for holding up to 4 sockets.

A bit module can be mounted on the socket tray and used as an alternative for screwdriver bits.

The **bit tray** is designed for holding up to 8 bits.

The **stacklight** is a high-visibility signaling device that reports the status of the tightening operation.

It contains four light modules and a buzzer and is controlled by inputs/outputs.

The **operator panel** is a flexible lamp and switch box designed to interface with the system.

The **I/O expander** has been designed to increase the number of I/Os of your system by adding 8 inputs and 8 outputs. It allows to bring the I/O closer to the operator position.



CVI CONFIG



CVI CONFIG is designed to set your systems point to point or via network with an intuitive and guided interface.

From your computer, you can set up Desoutter tightening products, cord tools, cordless tools, WI-FI cordless tools, accessories, peripherals and tightening processes.

You can also configure Fieldbus, protocols, backup and you can send data to CVINET WEB for traceability.

CVIMONITOR

CVIMONITOR is included in CVI CONFIG and is intended to monitor and diagnostic in live your systems.

- Check directly Inputs/Outputs and Fieldbus for an easy commissioning.
- View in real-time tightening results and curves.
- Monitor your system by viewing and analyzing all actions performed by the system (user infos).
- Set preventive alarms for tools, test LEDs and triggers, calibrate tools, get all information about tools.

CVIMONITOR can also be used in standalone and launched directly from the deskop launch bar.

In that case, tightening products must be connected to the PC via an Ethernet cable.

And cordless tools must be connected to the PC by using eDOCK.

- Collect and display the last 100 results executed by tools.
- Set up network configurations and WI-FI settings of cordless tools.
- · Perform maintenance tasks.

About Installation and Upgrade manual

This manual describes how to install and upgrade the CVI3 System.

(i) Before starting, you **must** read and understand the safety instructions given in the booklet supplied in the packaging box of products.

At the end of installation, the tool status is "Tool locked", awaiting the selection of the tightening operation named "Pset".

To test and validate the system is properly working, follow the procedure described in this manual.

Warranty

- Product warranty will expire 12 months after the product is first taken into use, but will in any case expire at the latest 13 months after delivery.
- Normal wear and tear on parts is not included within the warranty.
 - Normal wear and tear is that which requires a part change or other adjustment/overhaul during standard tools maintenance typical for that period (expressed in time, operation hours or otherwise).
- The product warranty relies on the correct use, maintenance, and repair of the tool and its component parts.

- Damage to parts that occurs as a result of inadequate maintenance or performed by parties other than Desoutter or their Certified Service Partners during the warranty period is not covered by the warranty.
- To avoid damage or destruction of tool parts, service the tool according to the recommended maintenance schedules and follow the correct instructions.
- Warranty repairs are only performed in Desoutter workshops or by Certified Service Partners.

Desoutter offers extended warranty and state of the art preventive maintenance through its Tool Care contracts. For further information contact your local Service representative.

For electrical motors:

• Warranty will only apply when the electric motor has not been opened.



Installation restrictions

Checking the line voltage

Before connecting the controllers to the main supply, check that the line voltage is appropriate.

Line voltage (V)

100-120 / 200-240 V~

The symbol ~ means "alternating current".

Note that controllers can support $100-240 \text{ V} \sim \text{single phase}$. However, the system works correctly at $100-120 \text{V} \sim 200-240 \text{V} \sim$.

Earthing the controller

Controllers must be plugged into an outlet properly installed and grounded in accordance with all relevant codes and ordinances.

Never remove the grounding prong or modify the plug in any way.

Do not use any adaptor plugs.

Check with a qualified electrician if you are in doubt as to whether the outlet is properly grounded.

Line protection

Controllers have a JVL6-32 residual current circuit breaker with over-current protection which provides protection against earth leakage faults (30mA), overloads, short-circuits and over-current in the installation.



There is no fuse.

The over-current protection of the JVL6-32 uses "D" tripping characteristics.




Figure 1 - Curve C and D

External power consumption

The decision to install an external differential circuit-breaker depends on the type of internal electric network in the customer's plant.

This device detects any insulation defect between one of the phases of the network and the earth, immediately stops the tool by automatic power cutoff and protects the operator from any electric shock.


Should circuit-breakers be installed at the line head, we recommend that you select equipment with the following specifications:

Single-phased 110V 32A - curve D.


Recommended installation order

- 5. Install and connect eBUS accessories, ePOD, Fieldbus modules and other peripherals.
- 6. Power on the controller.
- 7. Install a complete solution connected to Ethernet.


How to install a quick-stop system

On delivery, I/O connectors are mounted in the controller and a shunt has been wired as shown. This means that the controller is continuously powered.



If you require a quick-stop system, replace the existing shunt by the quick-stop wiring as shown below.

(i) Before removing the I/O connectors, switch off the GFI blue interruptor located on the bottom panel.



Place the I/O connectors back in the controller as shown below.





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


Example of tightening process through IO timing chart



- 1. "Reset" signal is sent by the PLC. This leads to reset the report ("Tightening OK/NOK").
- 2. The controller receives the selection of Pset 1. The command is acknowledged by "Pset Selected" signal.
- 3. The controller detects the "Start/Stop Tightening On State" signal transition. The tightening operation starts and "Tightening Running" signal is set to 1.
- 4. At the end of the tightening process, the controller sets "Tightening OK" or "Tightening NOK" signals.
- 5. "Tightening Running" signals returns to zero when all operations are over.






As the reaction force increases in proportion to the tightening torque, there is a risk of severe bodily injury of the operator as a result of unexpected behavior of the tool.

▶ Make sure that the tool is in perfect working order and the system is programmed correctly.





1. Connect the cable to the tool.



Plug the cable with help of TOP indication.

Tighten the nut. No need to tighten it too much.

The locking system will prevent any loosening.

To enable the loosening of the cable, actuate the locking trigger at the bottom of the handle.

2. Connect the cable to the controller.

Read before installing tool cables

(i) Do not connect several extension cables together. Preferably use the longest length of extension cable and the shortest length of tool cable.










Although our tool cables are designed to work under drastic conditions, we recommend that you check the following points for longer service life:


- a Any direct pull on the cable should be avoided.
- b Friction with the outer sheath should be restricted.
- c Bending radii should not be lower than 10 times the cable diameter.

Instructions for cables of fixtured tools


The cable shall not apply any traction to the tool. Any traction force on the cable (even low intensity depending on the cable orientation) can generate a torque signal on the transducer.

Check the cables are long enough or clamp the tool cable on the mounting plate as shown below.



Connecting cordless tools to CVI3 Vision

(i) Ensure to have the last version of firmware and software for controllers and CVI CONFIG.

To install them, go to the chapter "Upgrade" in this manual.

There are 2 typical configurations:

- You have just received new Desoutter products (CVI3 Vision, cordless tool and WI-FI access point) and you
 want to create a basic workstation. The only thing to do is to declare the cordless tool in the controller by creating a new tightening unit.
- You want to add one cordless tool in an existing installation or add a second cordless tool in your installation.
 You will have to change the communication parameters of the cordless tool by using CVI MONITOR or the easy-pairing feature.

Creating a basic workstation with a cordless tool

On delivery, Desoutter products (CVI3 Vision controller, cordless tool and WI-FI access point) are already programmed to communicate together.

The tool communicates with the controller via the WI-FI access point.

Example of installation with settings by default.





- 1. Connect the WI-FI access point to any Ethernet port of the controller bottom panel.
- 2. Plug a full-loaded battery pack to the cordless tool.
- 3. Declare the cordless tool into CVI3 Vision controller.

When the connection is done, the top left icon on the tool display is green and steady.



How to change communication parameters of cordless tools

Easy-pairing via eDOCK and CVI MONITOR

Create first a tightening unit "51" in the controller for the cordless tool.

Plug the eDOCK to the tool and connect it to the USB port of the computer.

Plug a battery pack to the tool.

Keep the tool awake.


Launch CVI MONITOR and click the tab "Tool".

Click Select.

When the tool is connected to the computer, the icon on the top left is as follows:









Click this icon.



Click this icon to display the current parameters of the tool.

Change the parameters.

Check that IP address, subnet mask and port number of the controller are correct.



Click this icon to write the new parameters into the tool.

The tool display shows Boot loader written in blue.

(i) If the message is red, check the parameters and restart the procedure from the beginning.

When the connection is done, the top left icon on the tool display is green and steady.

Easy-pairing via CVI CONFIG

Launch CVI CONFIG.



Go to the working area, click this icon to add a CVI3 Vision. Enter the IP address of the controller and click "Finish".

Go in the tree view area on the left, expand Parameters and click Networks.

In the box "TCP/IP - Ethernet" check the IP address and subnet mask of the controller.

In the box "WIFI access point", enter the wireless parameters of the WI-FI access point.

Go to "Tightening unit - 51" and expand it. Click "Tools" and expand it. Click the tab "Setup".

In the box "Network", enter the parameters for the cordless tool.

You have 3 choices:

- 1 Keep original IP address (no change). Warning: the tool IP address must be already compliant with both WI-FI access point and controller.
- 2 Static IP address. Enter manually the IP address, subnet mask and gateway of the tool.
- 3 DHCP. Use this choice if the WI-FI access point or network includes a DHCP server. The IP address may change at each connection.



Click this icon to update CVI CONFIG.

Plug the eDOCK to the tool and connect it to the USB port of the controller bottom panel.

Plug a battery pack to the tool.

Keep the tool awake.

Go to the controller, tap "Maintenance / Tool / Pairing".





Tap this icon to start.

The tool display shows **Boot loader** written in blue. If the message is red, check the wireless parameters and restart the procedure from the beginning.

When the connection is done, the top left icon on the tool display is green and steady.

What if the connection is not done?

1. Check that the tool communicates with the WI-FI access point.

On the tool display, press the button below the red arrow during 3 seconds.

Use the red arrows to go to "Maintenance", press OK, go to "Network" and press OK.

Press the right arrow many times until you get "RSSI".

If the value is displayed in green, orange or red depending on the RSSI signal quality, this means that the tool is communicating with the WI-FI access point.

If the RSSI value is -100 dB in red, go back to CVI MONITOR to change the wireless parameters and write them into the tool again.

2. In a second step, check that the tool communicates with the controller.

Connect the access point to the same Ethernet network as the controller.

Check that firmware versions of both tool and controllers are the most recent.

If not, contact your Desoutter representative.

Check that subnet masks are correct in the controller, tool and WI-FI access point.

For example, when all IP address are 192.168.5.xxx, the subnet mask is 255.255.255.0. If one of them is 192.168.7.xxx, the subnet mask could be 255.255.0.0.).

Adding a cordless tool in an existing installation

Ensure you have a CVI3 Vision controller and a new or existing WI-FI access point.

Do as follows:

- 1. If the WI-FI access point is new, install it and connect it to any port of the controller bottom panel via an Ethernet cable or to the same Ethernet network as the controller.
- 2. Consult your IT department to get the communication parameters of the installation (IP address and port of the controller and wireless parameters of the existing WI-FI access point. Click here *How to set up networks* [Page 47].
- 3. Declare the cordless tool in CVI3 Vision controller.
- 4. Change the communication parameters of the cordless tool as described previously.


eBUS connector wiring diagram

How to ping an IP address

This function is used to check the network connection with any device connected on the network.

Select the IP address to ping. There are 4 attempts.

For CVI3 Essential / CVI3 Function, go to **Configuration > Network**, use the keys up and down to select the IP address to ping and validate.

For CVI3 Vision and TWINCVI3, go to **Maintenance > Controller > Ping**. Tap the box **IP address**, enter the IP address and validate. Tap the red arrow to start. Tap the red square to stop.

How to ping an IP address with CVIMONITOR

Installing a complete solution connected to Ethernet





Testing and validating

The goal is to have a cord tool and a cordless tool running a simple tightening process named "Pset".

In our example, a cord tool and a cordless tool are connected to a CVI3 Vision controller. CVI CONFIG software is installed on the computer.

See the procedure below. Detailed instructions are following.

- 1. Check that the tool associated to the tightening unit is the correct one.
- 2. Check the status of the tool.
- 3. Connect the computer to the controller.
- 4. Launch CVI CONFIG software and create a Pset for each tool.
- 5. Transfer the configuration to the controller.
- 6. Press the trigger to run the tool.
- 7. Read the results.

Updating the tool information

The parameters of the tool connected must be updated in CVI CONFIG before creating a tightening process.

Check that the tool associated to the tightening unit is the correct one.

Go to CVI CONFIG.

Select the product in the tree view.

Select the tightening unit which drives the tool.

Click the tool and if the tool is not the correct one, click the tab **Setup**.

Click the box **Tool model**, scroll the list and select the tool.

Go to the tab **Information**.

Check the information is correct.

Click the button **Update** to update the information. This implies that the product is connected to the system or to the computer.

A green tick confirms that the tool parameters are OK.

A red cross means that the tool is not connected. Check the connections and start again from the beginning.

Alternatively, use the **shortcut** in the tree view. Select the tool, right-click and select **Update**.

See the green tick next to the tool name in the tree view.

Checking the current status of tools

Tool 1 is the cord tool, tool 51 is the cordless tool.

See that the controller has been added in the working area.

Values are already present as the software has uploaded all tools characteristics.

Tightening unit 1 is driving Tool 1 (cord tool), tightening unit 51 is driving Tool 51 (cordless tool).

Go to the Tree view area, expand Tightening unit - 1 and click Psets.

Right-click Psets, add a Pset and click OK.




